VOLUNTEER PROGRAM OPENS OFFICE IN SAN LEANDRO

Office space at the San Leandro Community Church was chosen for the new volunteer program of Lavender Seniors. New Director, Rosamaria Zayas, and board President, Dottie Fowler, negotiated with the church to establish a permanent office for the program. They were impressed by the interest of the church in the program and their desire to have Lavender Seniors in their building. They offered a reasonable rent and showed a willingness to be helpful in making necessary changes to the office space and entryway. It is important that our new program be housed in a supportive atmosphere.

Lavender Seniors will be sharing space in an active, involved community center at the church. There are services for child care, battered women, food distribution, Welfare to Work program, and computer training.

Work is underway to paint and furnish the new office. A security system is being installed with our own entryway. A new telephone system and with a new number is being installed. (510) 667-9655

Rosamaria Zayas, director, is setting priorities for establishing the program as soon as possible. High on the list will be publicity and outreach to find and train volunteers and seniors in need of their services

SAN LEANDRO SCHOOLS

It took almost a full school year, to get the San Leandro Board of Education to agree that a "Human Relations Advisory Committee" was needed. Now just about a year after that decision, it has not yet been implemented. I phoned Tom Himmelberg, Superintendent of the Board of Education 895-4199, today (4/8/99). I asked why nothing had been implemented. He told me that the Chair of the Board Committee for Human Relationship was held by Ken Pon (one of the members fo the Board of Education). He also referred me to Jim Bolar, 667-3523, who is in charge of getting committee chosen. I called Jim Bolar, and requested an up date on what was happening, so that I could report to you. He sent me two pages of information and an application serve on the board. They are taking applications until the 16th of April, after that they will decide who they want. I am sure they do not want me. But I asked for an application and I will be sending it in. Himmelberg told me that they now have a 'Hate Behavior Policy" in place. I was not given a copy of that. The following is an exact copy of the first paragraph on the first page of the papers that he sent me. I think you can see it is very diluted and probably not much more than worthless. It certainly is not what we fought for.

Charge to the Committee

Provide informational input in furthering the District's Mission to "educate students to achieve and

demonstrate academic excellence and become confident, collaborative and competitive in a global society..." And support the Distrist's beliefs that "all people can learn, every person has value, diversity enriches and strengthens our lives, people have the right to make their own decisions, individutals are accountable and responsible for their behavior, helping others helps ourselves, individuals need to feel safe and secure within their community, it takes a whole community to raise a child, respect for self and other is essential, self-esteem is essential for personal growth, and all individuals have the right to equal access to quality education" by promoting the understanding of the diversities and commonalities amoung people and to foster respect for both the differences and similarities.

I informed Tom and Jim, that I was calling for WOFF and we want action now. Please call the men and the following board members. Tom Himmelberg, 895-4199. Jim Bolar, 667-3523, Fred Collins, 357-5272, Esther Holcomb, 562-4024, Kenneth Pon, 483-5544. Pauline Cutter. 5697797, Linda Perry 352-7679 and anyone else you can think of.

Remember..., we are not and have not asked for anything except equal rights for the gay and lesbian students and teachers. I think they are entitled to this.

BOOK REVIEW

It's not unusual: A History of Lesbian and Gay Britain in the 20th Century

by Alkarim Jiuani Indiana University Press

Paperback \$16.00

It is refreshing to see how gays in other cultures and time periods have managed to survive prejudice and ignorance.

Alkarim Jiuani, editor of the London arts magazine, Time Out, has fashioned a lively chronicle of Lavender history from 1918 to the present among our British cousins.

During the 1920's the term homosexual sprang from the psychiatrists's couch and into the street. Radclyffe Hall's, Well of Loneliness punctured the public's innocence forever. One number of the House of Lords proclaimed the women of Britain must never be told that lesbians existed.

Gay people were said to wear brown swede shoes and pink shirts.

British gays and American G.I.'s loved each other during the blackouts in London as they battled Hitler's air raids. As Quentin Crisp fondly recalls, "Never have so many been done by so few."

During the McCarthy era, the English suffered along with American gays. In 1954, the medical journal, The Practitioner, openly displayed a ludicrous bit of homophobia: "Homosexuals should be sent to remote Scottish islands like St. Kilda where the natural and bracing climate would strengthen their resolve."

Police tactics were brutal. Terrified men were hauled to police stations in the dead of night and grilled. Rupert-Croft Cook and other noted writers were caught up in the net of terror. Authorities demanded that he return his war metals and he refused.

The most famous case involved Lord Montague and Peter Wildblood. They were forced into prison. Wildblood wrote a harrowing account called, Against The Law (1955) detailing his ordeal.

Finally the Episcopal Church formed a committee and urged law reform. This led to the celebrated Wolfenden Report. In 1957 the age old sodomy law was reconsidered for the first time since 1533. But reform didn't come until 1967. Then gays were told, according to Jiuani, to shut up and be eternally grateful for any favor they got.

The 1960's brought a dramatic burst of liberalism. The films, The Trials of Oscar Wilde and Victim heralded a new era. The Gay Liberation Front arrived.

Arch conservative Mary Whitehouse fought back with her Festival of Light and was largely responsible for driving Gav News of London out of business.

However, the age of consent for sexual relations was lowered from twenty-one to eighteen.

Then came AIDS, "Are You Being Served," and more notables such as Ian McKellen came out of the closet.

This stirring sage of gay England is brisk and to the point. And there is a generous selection of photographs depicting the various time periods.

Let us be aware of the lessons of history which the young of today are determined to ignore. The dark ages can always return.


