Those of us who were able to attend the 12th Annual Creating Change Conference, sponsored by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, which was held in Oakland Nov. 10-14, 1999, heard about the Gill Foundation, which is based in Colorado. Its mission is to fund and in other ways help support GLBT and HIV/AIDS programs. In conjunction with the Conference, the Gill Foundation offered a special project, the "Hometown Heroes Challenge Campaign," in order to encourage Conference attendees to make donation to a GLBT organization in their home area. Within certain limits and stipulations, the Gill Foundation would then not only match, but doubly match the amounts! We got to work on it and eventually accumulated a total of \$1350. We want to especially thank (in alphabetical order) Meg Bruynell and Bobbie Jarvis; Dick Colton; Jim Joslin; Stella Lopez-Armijo and Ina Mae Murri; Donna Montgomery; Margaret Shepherd, Natalie Zarchin, and the four who attended the conference and submitted the grant applications: Marvin Burrows and his partner Bill; Dotty Fowler; Dot Hallinan; Frank Howell; and John Ellefsen.

John Ellefsen started to contact other Lavender Seniors for possible contributions, but he ran out of time to meet the deadline. The good news is that The Gill Foundation did award us with a total grant of \$2700. The grand total was \$4,050! We want to extend our heartfelt thanks to the Gill Foundation. Especially for small, grass-roots, volunteer-run organizations like ours, such a grant is a tremendous boost.

As Lavender Seniors gradually expands its services, we need more money to support our efforts to reach out to others in our community. California Bills in Effect

AB 26, by Assembly member Carole Migden, would create a statewide domestic partnership registry with the Secretary of State. Domestic partners would include same-sex couples as well as unmarried opposite-sex couples over the age of 62. The bill would provide hospital visitation rights between domestic partners and would provide state and local employers the ability to offer health care coverage to the domestic partners of their employees and annuitants. (SPONSOR).

Status: 10/02/99 - Signed into law by Gov. Gray Davis; 10/10/99 -

Chaptered by Secretary of State: Chapter 588, Statutes of 1999

AB 537, by Assembly member Sheila Kuehl, would amend the California Education Code's general anti-discrimination and harassment provisions (Sections 200, 220, 66251, and 66270) to prohibit discrimination and harassment in the public schools and community colleges' programs and activities "regardless of any basis that is contained in the prohibition of hate crimes set forth in Penal Code Section 422.6(a)." a By referencing the current hate crimes statute, actual or perceived lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgendered students will be protected from discrimination and harassment. (SUPPORT).

Status: 10/02/99 û Signed into law by Gov. Gray Davis. 10/10/99 û Chaptered by Secretary of State: Chapter 598, Statutes of 1999.

AB 1001, by Assembly Speaker Antonio Villaraigosa, would move the provision prohibiting employment discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation from the Labor Code to the Fair Employment and Housing Act (FEHA). In adding sexual orientation to FEHA, it would codify existing case law prohibiting housing discrimination based on sexual orientation. Status:

BOOK REVIEW by Frank Howell

Wilde's Last Stand: Decadence, Conspiracy And The First World War

(British import, available at Different Light Bookstore, San Francisco)

The fascination with Oscar Wilde and his ultimate tragedy never seems to abate (witness Gross Indecency and a film about his life currently in circulation).

But what came after the Wilde scandal, imprisonment and death? How were later generations affected? What legacy does the witty Irishman leave us?

Noel Pemberton Billing, a right wing combination of Newt Gingrich and "B-l Bob" of Orange County fame, ran a one man band attempting to save Great Britain from the lurid moral threats of the day such as homosexuality, foreign influences and general decline of social standards. He rallied against a production of Wilde's Salome featuring one Maude Adams, a rising matinee idol of her day. She was attacked by both Billing and also Lord Alfred Douglas (Bosie) the former lover of Wilde. Douglas changed radically after his old mentors death, becoming reactionary and haughty. He married and raised children.

A five day trial was held in June, 1918, which gripped all of England in suspense. There emerged rumors of an infamous black book containing the names of 47,000 English men and women who were accused of corrupting the British people and helping Germany to win the

war. The leading socialites of English society were implicated. Gay stigma hung over the trial like dense perfume.

Philip Hoare, noted reviewer, critic, and author of a recent biography of Noel Coward, delivers a chronicle of these events in an engaging and highly readable style, filled with subtle observation and telling detail.

Billing, a maverick inventor and politician, even attempted to implicate lesbians in a so called "Cult of The Clitoris."

Social upheavals caused by the war produced avant garde night clubs and artists of controversial taste. As a result of such a climate, the trial was widely reported in the press and Billing whipped public feeling into a frenzy. German iniquity was detected at every turn. Billing even bullied Prime Minister Lloyd George. He frequently referred to the evil influence of Wilde.

On the final day of the trial the jury was instructed to determine whether Salome was morally corrupting. All other questions were to be ignored.

Billing was found not guilty on all counts. But in later years the British turned against him and he was never again elected to public office. Like "B-1 Bob,"

Billing shouted down the speaker in Parliament and he was bodily removed from the building.

Billing railed against the ghost of poor Oscar whenever possible, "This social leper, Oscar Wilde, had founded a cult of sodomy in this country and traveled from end to end of it perverting youth wherever he could. He left behind his works, so that his crimes may be perpetuated even after he was dead."

The final years of Lord Douglas were sad and frustrating. He continued to rant and rave and was widely viewed as a tiresome old crank. He was imprisoned for libel and finally expired in 1945, bitter and worn out. Maude Allen never regained fame as an actress, although she attempted many comebacks. She died in obscurity in Los Angeles in 1956.

The social inheritance of Oscar Wilde survived all obstacles. Gay artists and those of flamboyant gestures flourished quite handily. Noel Coward stands as a notable example, followed by an army of lavender folk such as Christoper Isherwood, W. H. Auden and Cecil Beaton.

Good night Oscar, wherever you are. The world is still safe for your kind.






