The California Department of Aging (CDA) is supporting research partners and a statewide coalition of LGBTQIA+ community-based organizations to design and launch California's first statewide survey documenting the needs, hopes and priorities of mid-life and older LGBTQIA+ residents across the state.

Mid-life and older LGBTQIA+ Californians are part of a generation that faced extreme levels of stigma during their lifetimes as well as pride in a movement that asserted civil rights for LGBTQIA+ people of all ages. Despite the central role that LGBTQIA+ Californians play in California's history and in communities across the state, no baseline data are available that describe their aging experiences. Some studies, such as a COVID-19 study of LGBTQIA+ older adults in San Francisco, suggest higher rates of isolation, depression and suicide ideation, all of which could be addressed with more responsive and accessible services. As CDA and others seek to learn more about the aging experience of all Californians in support of the California Master Plan on Aging (MPA) goals for equity and inclusion, it is crucial that the unique life experiences within LGBTQIA+ communities are visible and honored.

California's survey of mid-life and older LGBTQIA+ residents will paint an up-to-date and comprehensive statewide portrait. To offer insights about the experiences of marginalized and underserved LGBTQIA+ communities, the survey team will oversample Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC), Hispanic/Latinx, and Asian Pacific Islander (API) communities, as well as rural and frontier communities. The survey data will form a first-ever baseline data set, which will be available to other researchers in an open-source format to encourage additional research and policy attention to the needs of mid-life and older LGBTQIA+ Californians.

Ernest Mali Andrews, he/him (L) and Randy Jordan, he/him (R)

A handsome army brat, model and fashionista from Eatonton, Georgia crossed paths with a charming, thespian and choreographer from Brooklyn, New York, and an eternal flame was ignited...

This is the (love) story of Ernest Mali Andrews and Randy Jordan.

Eatonton is known as the dairy capitol of Georgia. World renown writers, Joel Chandler Harris, and Alice Walker both hail from Eatonton but who

would have thought that Eatonton would be the birthplace of one of the Bay area's prominent Black LGBTQ Elders, fashion influencers and community health workers, Mr. Randy Jordan. Randy was born in the 50's and while being Black and gay in the south does not sound ideal, his family and community were always very loving and supportive, so he never mistreated or that he had to "come out". Randy was always Randy and he remained in Putnam County until he enlisted in the Army and headed out west to the Golden State.

After getting his cosmetology license while serving in the Military, he quickly got his BA in Fashion after landing in San Francisco in the 70s. Randy was a regular on the Ebony Fashion Fair circuit until one moment changed his life forever. In 1986, Randy was diagnosed with HIV. He was saddened to see his friends start to die around him but remained optimistic and considers himself a survivor of a time when an already oppressed group of people were being further oppressed by ignorance and stupidity around this new thing called AIDS.

The 90's offered some reprieve with advancements in medications, but Randy suffered another blow when he was diagnosed with cancer in 1994. It was during this time that Randy decided to retire due to his health. In true Aquarius fashion though, he bounced back and was ready to return to work after only 2 years, kicking off a very successful run with MVET, a non-profit for HIV+ veterans.



All the way up the easts coast, in the city that never sleeps, another one of the Bay area's most prestigious Black LGBTQ+ Elders and community leaders, was coming into his own. Bedford–Stuyvesant is the birthplace of many notable people like Lena Horne, Shirley Chisholm, Jay–Z, Lil' Kim and many others. Add to that list our very own, Mr. Ernest Mali Andrews.

Growing up in New York and the busy borough of "Bed-Stuy" (as it is known to most), was a young, gay Black youths dream, right? Well not quite, when your family is not "comfortable" with your "lifestyle" or tells you, "We can't have *that* in this house." It is a phrase and sentiment heard all too often by members of the LGBTQ community navigating growing up and finding their identities. Mali, however, did not let that hold him back. He started theater and dance at age nine and left home at the tender age of 15.

This was in part, because Mali was outed by his father, a Veteran and strict disciplinarian, who was so militant, "he would throw a quarter on the bed and if it bounced you had to remake it!". Mali's father grew so suspicious of his "lifestyle" and closeness with a certain, older chorographer "friend" of his, that he got the friend to confess about their relationship after intentionally overserving cocktails at a family dinner. Despite the circumstances, his family remained supportive and eventually became more accepting and understanding. Mali was determined to finish high school and became the first recipient of John F. Kennedy Memorial Citizenship Award. He was also the first Black student body president. After high school Mali went on to act in several Broadway productions most notably the Richie Havens produced, Safari 300.

Although they were each destined for success in their own respective careers, it was through community health work with AIDS/HIV, that Randy and Mali's paths crossed and eventually intertwined forever. It would take a couple of fateful run-ins though. Mali first saw Randy on the cover of Sierra Domino, the first Gay men's publication to feature all Black models. They ran into each other at the Eagle Creek bar in San Francisco while Mali was doing outreach and again at rehearsal for a fashion show that Randy was in years later. It was not until a night at Cables Reef in Oakland in 1992, however, that stars aligned for these two souls to unite. A run in at the bar turned into a date, which led to them making it "official" in 1995 and eventually getting married in 2008.









Both Randy and Mali are now retired and living a "peaceful, blessed and highly favored," life in Concord where they were able to find neighboring and conjoined apartments. Randy still hopes to publish a book of poetry and short stories and travel to Asia. Mali has been focusing on taking care of Randy and making sure "me and my husband are both happy, healthy and able to enjoy life together." They were both recently involved in a car accident on their way to Lavender Seniors Third Friday Lunch Bunch.

When asked about legacy, Mali feels like he has always ended up where he needed to be. He wanted to learn and be an advocate for people of color living with HIV and his work has been recognized by the cities of San Francisco and Oakland, The CA Senate and he even has two days named after him. The day he retired from the AIDS task force in June of 1995 and October 22 in Oakland are officially known as "Ernest Mali Andrews" Day! Randy, who is living with no regrets, remains thankful for "the wonderful spirit God put in my path." He wishes more people can experience coming out as he did and reminds us that, "You are worthy. Love yourself. Know yourself. Trust yourself."

We honor and celebrate you, Mali and Randy. Not just for the amazing legacy you have created for the LGBTQ+ community, but for your amazing testimony about #blacklove. Cheers to the both of you!

Grand Lake Theater Black Queer Film Screenings

Starting Sunday February 4th, 12pm - 2pm This screening is FREE Tongues Untied (55 minutes) Location: Grand Lake Theater, 3200 Grand Ave, Oakland Egyptian Theater Panel discussion will follow.

Filmed in Oakland, San Francisco, and New York City, Tongues Untied shares fierce examples of homophobia and racism: the man refused entry to a gay bar because of his color; the college student left bleeding on the sidewalk after a gay-bashing; the loneliness and isolation of the drag queen or trans woman. Yet, they also affirm the Black, gay male experience: protest marches, smoky bars, "snap diva," humorous "musicology" and vogue dancers, in Marlon Riggs' seminal film.

Marlon Riggs graduated magna cum laude from Harvard and received his Master's degree in journalism from the University of California, Berkeley, where he became the youngest tenured professor at the Graduate School of Journalism.

In 1989, Marlon completed his landmark experimental documentary film Tongues Untied. Ultimately, it was aired on national PBS as part of the television series P.O.V. The three principal voices of Tongues Untied are those of Riggs, and poets Essex Hemphill, and Joseph Beam. Tongues Untied had political backlash; Republican Senator Jesse Helms famously argued to defund the arts after its release. He produced, wrote, and directed several documentary films, including Ethnic Notions, Tongues Untied, Color Adjustment, and Black Is...Black Ain't. His films examine past and present representations of race and sexuality in the United States.

Marlon Riggs was an Oakland resident and lived in the Adams Point neighborhood where he died of AIDS related complications in 1994 at the age of 37.

About the Show

Marga Gomez's Swimming With Lesbians is a full steam farce that takes place aboard "The Celesbian," regarded as the most notorious cruise ship on the high seas. Throughout the show Marga morphs into a boatload of twisted characters includina: Isabelle a disaraced Lacrosse player yearning for her first Lesbian affair, Captain Debbie who is always ready to go down in the ship and the outwardly jovial but secretly meek bingo caller Pru Perez. Passengers look up to Pru as an alpha lesbian until the fateful day at sea when her old boarding school bully, Arlene, shows up on the Lezzo Deck ready to expose Pru's darkest secret. Pru is forced to to sink or swim while The Celesbian's crew and cruisers must navigate through lust, endless buffets and rogue waves. This seafaring story was hailed as having "all the makings of a great voyage, starting with scrumptious characters" by the San Francisco Chronicle." The Center's Elder Services promotes a positive and healthy quality of life for senior and elder LGBTQ+ individuals 55+ by ensuring they continue to be supported, respected, and connected as they advance in age.
