2024 is also Lavender Senior's Pearl (30th) Anniversary! Stay tuned for a big announcement in the coming months...



Meet our new Elder Services Coordinator, Julian Leus!

Julian (they/them), is a proud Bay Area native, born in Hayward, California and raised by hardworking Filipinx immigrant parents, grandparents, and aunties. As a queer non-binary person and one of the first in their family to grow up in the United States, Julian naturally found a passion for advancing the social justice, visibility, and welfare of LGBTQ+ and BIPOC folx.

After obtaining their B.A. in History from the University of California, Davis, Julian worked in a variety of human/social services positions throughout the Bay Area, ranging from educational support services, local elections, child welfare, family caregiver support, and now as a social services professional for the LGBTQ+ and senior community. Julian is delighted to work at the Oakland LGBTQ Community Center to help LGBTQ+ seniors get connected with vital services and support, such as food assistance, housing and relocation, mental health support, sexual health services, and more.

In their free time, Julian enjoys cooking recipes from different cuisines, traveling, attending concerts and music festivals, collecting crystals, reading Tarot, visiting the ocean, spending time with friends and family, and cuddling with their Beagle, Rover.





Tribute to a fellow traveler by John David Dupree

Former Lavender Seniors board member, Michael J. "Mike" Mora, passed away on 7th December, just 12 days before he would've turned

86. He had dealt successfully for 40+ years with a diabetes diagnosis but had recently suffered from complications.

Mike was born in Albuquerque, the oldest of four. His two sisters, Laurie and Lupie, survive him. His brother, Gilbert, the youngest of the four, died about ten years ago. The family was active in the Catholic Church, including stints for Mike as an altar boy in the local parish.

Mike attended Ohlone College in Fremont and St. Mary's College in Moraga. While he was working at Capwell's in El Cerrito, a co-worker named Jean took a shine to him, asked him out for lunch and the rest is history. They were married for over 30 years until her death in 1999. Their marriage produced one son, Mike Jr., who survives his parents at age 60.



Mike worked for 30+ years for Bank of America. One of Mike Jr's fondest memories came after his Dad won a bank trivia contest in 1986 and the family was able to have an all-expenses-paid week in Switzerland.

"As a result of winning that contest, the three of us took the one holiday I can remember that didn't involve visiting family in New Mexico," Mike Jr. recalls. "We stayed in Zermatt with a spectacular view of the Matterhorn, then drove all over the country exploring cities like Geneva and areas famous for skiing and other athletic and cultural activities. It was such an exciting adventure!"

After a year or so mourning the loss of his wife, Mike told friends it was time for him to deal with something he'd known about himself since childhood. He became involved with Lavender Seniors in the early 2000s, became a board member and joined a group called "We're Still Here" in 2008. He last attended the December 2022 holiday dinner party and had been planning to attend that holiday party again this year on 7th December. Unfortunately, his son, Mike Jr., found him at home in a diabetic coma a few days earlier, from which he did not regain consciousness. He died the same day as the group's holiday party.





Meanwhile, Mike Jr. had come out to his mother as gay in the mid-1990s, a few years before she died. In fact, she met and spent time with one of the men he was dating at the time. When he came out to his Dad a few years later, however, he was somewhat surprised by the response he got.

"Dad – who didn't come out to me until several years after Mom died – initially said things like I had 'broken his soul'," Mike Jr. recalls. "I think he may have been feeling some guilt about influencing me unconsciously in some way, perhaps afraid I would become an unhappy stereotypical gay man, sleeping around with one-night stands and no commitments. But my husband and I have been together for 24 years and officially married for 8 years. I know how happy he was for us."

For many years after Mike Sr. came out to Mike Jr. and his husband, the three spent a lot of time together, including a standing Sunday night dinner date – usually with Mike Sr. cooking for and hosting the trio.

"That weekly gathering went on for years," Mike Jr. recounts. "We became closer and closer. Only in the last few years, his cooking and entertaining energy had begun to wane, so we had lots of breakfasts out together instead. It was so good to see Dad accepting himself and sharing openly about his life and relationships these last two decades."

"We're Still Here" continues to meet on Zoom each month since Covid and in-person for the holiday celebration each December since 2021.

"For the 12 years before Covid, the closing group circle hug that became our monthly tradition – following 'one-two-three' – and 'we're still here! – was always something we looked forward to," says Jumaane Makalani, a long-term member of the group. "That tradition and our numbers have both dwindled considerably since then. We lost two of the co-founders, Morris and Marlene, in 2022 – and now losing Mike in 2023. We're seeing the life-cycle in action here and will miss Mike a great deal. Like any family or group of close friends, we have to learn how to move on, keep their memories alive and celebrate the time we've had together."



December's Third Friday Lunch Bunch Holiday Extravaganza featured a performance from The Oakland Gay Men's Chorus

Born out of Ely Sonny Orquiza's Spring Play Production class, the work not only commemorates the 25th Anniversary of the THE LARAMIE PROJECT, but the first time students have taken the reins to raise the funds, select the play and venue, and manage the production process from top to bottom. It's truly an extraordinary effort!

Moisés Kaufman is a Tony and Emmy nominated director and playwright. His play 33 VARIATIONS, starring Jane Fonda, was nominated for five Tony awards (including one for Ms. Fonda). Previous to that, Mr. Kaufman directed the Pulitzer and Tony award-winning play I AM MY OWN WIFE, earning him an Obie award for his direction as well as Tony, Drama Desk, Outer Critics Circle, and Lucille Lortel nominations. His plays GROSS INDECENCY: THE THREE TRIALS OF OSCAR WILDE and THE LARAMIE PROJECT have been among the most performed plays in America over the last decade. Mr. Kaufman also directed the film adaptation of THE LARAMIE PROJECT for HBO, which was the opening night selection at the 2002 Sundance Film Festival and won the National

Board of Review Award, the Humanitas Prize, and a Special Mention for Best First Film at the Berlin Film Festival. The film also earned Mr. Kaufman two Emmy Award nominations for Best Director and Best Writer. He is the Artistic Director of Tectonic Theater Project and a Guggenheim Fellow in Playwriting. Other credits include BENGAL TIGER AT THE BAGHDAD ZOO (Mark Taper Forum); MACBETH with Liev Schreiber (Public Theater); THIS IS HOW IT GOES (Donmar Warehouse); ONE ARM by Tennessee Williams (Steppenwolf Theater Company); MASTER CLASS with Rita Moreno (Berkeley Repertory Theater); and LADY WINDERMERE'S FAN (Williamstown Theater Festival).
