▲ Friendly Visitors Program, to match volunteers with isolated, frail LGBT seniors for social support, light household and shopping assistance, and telephone assurance.

▲ Speakers Panel Program, to educate service providers and urge them to change policies and practices to make services more accessible and culturally appropriate to LGBT seniors.

▲ Potlucks on the second Saturday of each month, to provide a safe and welcoming social environment and information from invited speakers.




Before I became a member of East Bay Lavenders, I used to go to meeting of GLOE (now part of New Leaf) and still attend some special meetings there.



I decided to be a part of the group because it was not going to be just another social group. It was going to be a group of older gay people who were doing something positive for each other.



Regardless of where you live, this is a unique opportunity to educate government officials and learn how they view LGBT seniors and our interests. Come join the conversation!


