▲ The LGBT Seniors of Color Project, to improve access to health and human services to LGBT seniors in the African-American, Latino, Native American, Asian, and Pacific Islander communities.

Friendly Visitors Program, to match volunteers with isolated and/or frail LGBT seniors for social support, light household and shopping assistance, and telephone assurance.

▲ Speakers Panel Program, to educate service providers and urge them to change policies and practices to make services more accessible to LGBT seniors.

WHY MARRIAGE: THE HISTORY SHAPING TODAY'S DEBATE OVER GAY **EQUALITY BY GEORGE CHAUNCEY**

Basic Books

n 1973 my partner John and I decided to have a 1 "holy union" at Metropolitan Community Church. My parents attended, we served soft drinks and we were both so nervous we even forgot to take any pictures of the great event. It all seems so long ago now. In 1973 gay weddings were considered bizarre and outrageous. We invited my brother and sister and they refused to attend.

Religious conservatives like to think that marriage is a sacred institution that is carved in stone, rigid and never changing. But George Chauncey, Professor of American History at the University of Chicago and author of Gay New York, disagrees.

...marriage...is constantly shifting and evolving. Nothing is settled for eternity.

Applying rigorous scholarship he pulls us into the whirling chronicle of gay struggles and paints a portrait of marriage that is constantly shifting and evolving. Nothing is settled for eternity.

In 1948 at the United Nations the Universal Declaration of Human Rights made it clear that marriage is a basic human right. In that same year the California Supreme Court ruled that racial intermarriage could not be prevented. This was affirmed in 1967 when the U.S. Supreme Court announced (Loving v. Virginia) that black-white love was now legitimate.

A major tipping point was reached when Martin Luther opined that marital couplings should be considered civil and not controlled own children trod the pink brick road. by the church. For centuries before that weddings were an informal affair not looked after by the state.

In our own time many denominations have fought among themselves over the proper definitions of matrimony. But the lavender

community was not to be put off by controversy. We plowed ahead and created own our unique vision of love and community. Metropolitan Community Church now estimates that 85,000 holy unions have been performed.

The New York Supreme Court ruled in 1989 that gay couples have legal standing. Numerous medical and social science groups have filed legal briefs in support of our community.

But the radical right has not been idle. They, with the shameful cooperation of Bill Clinton, succeeded in passing the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA). Chauncey points out that they feared a threat to children and a blurring of gender roles. They believed their

The issue of marriage and how it will expand its social boundaries will be settled will be settled piece by piece over a long span of years. We can only wait and hope.

LAVENDER SENIORS AWARDED FOUR NEW GRANTS

Lavender Seniors has received four new grants to support its work to improve the quality of life of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender seniors. We gratefully acknowledge support from the following:

- East Bay Community Foundation awarded a \$2,500 general support grant.
- Horizons Foundation awarded \$5,000 to support a project to increase outreach to the East Bay's Latino communities by educating Latino community organizations about our programs and developing new ways to encourage more Latino community members to participate in our activities.
- The San Francisco Foundation awarded \$15,000 to support further diversification of our Board and participants, strengthen Lavender Juniors (our under-55 group of supporters), and expand our fundraising efforts.
- Most recently, the Sociological

 reasons that the East Bay's LGBT
 seniors are sometimes reluctant to

Lavender Seniors is one of thirteen organizations to receive a grant, from among more than 200 applicants nationwide.

transition in its director.


A new director will bring renewing energy to take the organization to its next level of development. Lavender Seniors is ready for the next chapter of its history.
