

January Book Review

We Have Three Great Book Reviews This Month:

Harvard's Secret Court: The Savage 1920 Purge of Campus Homosexuals

By William Wright

St. Martin's Press-\$25.95

It is well that from time to time we revisit our lavender past to measure the progress that has been achieved. A kangaroo court of sorts emerged in 1920 on the Harvard campus. A scandal erupted when Cyril Wilcox, a Harvard student, took his own life by turning on the gas. Apparently word was about to leak out that an informal sex ring was flourishing and the price for such merriment was about to be paid. Lester Wilcox, brother of Cyril, vowed to take legal action against the University.

The president of this distinguished institution, Lawrence Lowell, launched an immediate investigation and convened a secret panel of university officials to call in all

the students involved and grill them into confessing. Civil rights were completely beside the point as the witch hunt unfolded. You were guilty until proved otherwise. Only the reputation of grand old Harvard mattered.

The attitudes expressed by the five man board were characteristic of the 1920s. The freedom to indulge in consenting adult sexual relations in private was a novel concept yet to see the light of day. It was open season on the private lives of students or anyone else touched by disgrace.

The board of inquiry consisted of President Lowell, three deans, a regent and the head of the university health department. Some twenty boys were questioned on such matters as how often did they masturbate. Nothing was considered out of bounds.

As a result of the investigation most of the boys were terminated. A few were reinstated at a later date. One associate professor was destroyed professionally. His PhD degree was denied. Another student committed suicide in addition to Cyril Wilcox.

The court was determined that the entire affair was kept under wraps, never to be revealed.

It is ironic that President Lowell was the brother of Amy Lowell, noted poet and cigar smoking lesbian.

Some of the men managed to lead successful lives in later years, especially Ernest Roberts, a flamboyant gay, who married happily and achieved success as an interior decorator and Joe Lumbard, a prominent attorney who died in the 1990's at age 97.

The whole sordid affair was buried in the back files of the Harvard University Library until the papers were accidentally discovered and re-cataloged. Over 500 pages of documents and letters were the only witness to this incredible episode.

William Wright does a scholarly job of setting all events and characters in historical context. He graduated from Yale University in 1952 and has written for the New York Times, Vanity Fair and Town And Country.

The Harvard University of today stands in dramatic contrast to the institution of the 1920s. In 1983 the Harvard Gay and Lesbian Caucus was established and the **Gay And Lesbian Review Worldwide** is published on campus.

Over the years this world renowned university was considered by social observers as tolerant of alternate life styles. At Princeton there was a song popular in the 1950s, - "You can tell a Harvard man a mile away cause he looks (clap,clap) just like he"ll blow away..."

Why "Coming Out Again" Groups?

A Story from the Project Founder Reed Wilgoren

Hi, I'm Reed and I volunteer at the North Berkeley Senior Center. I attended a great event there called Gay Day Celebration that was well-attended by LGBT seniors and non-LGBT seniors alike!

After attending the celebration, however, I wondered where all the LGBT's over 55 disappeared to. Speaking for myself at 56, being disabled, I'm not exactly mainstream any more in gay life but still want to be social, politically aware, have fun, and perhaps meet a special person again. I certainly do not want to go back in the closet.

I went to a Lunch Bunch in October where we had a group discussion about things we can do in the community as LGBT elders to reach out to people who need connection. I decided to start a group at the North Berkeley Senior Center, to bring out all those folks who had come to the celebration, but seemed now to have gone back into hiding! I thought Coming Out Again might be a good name,

since so many of us end up back in the closet.

Bea Howard joined me as co-facilitator; we just had our first meeting in December. Although it was small, I truly believe this group will take off, with patience. All LGBTs 55 and older really need this in senior centers as well as senior housing and retirement communities.

I hope you can come to the group sometime! Or maybe you'll want to start one of these groups in your senior center or community.

Alameda County

Alameda County Board of Supervisors met and passed the Mental Health Services Act planning document which is the implementation of Prop. 63, passed by the voters of California last year. The document does not take into account the comments and inputs made by the Native American and LGBTQ communities, in spite extensive participation in their early planning process and at least two Public Hearings on the final draft document.

One of the speakers before the County Board of Supervisors was the Chairperson of the County Mental Health Advisory Committee who reviews this document on behalf of the Board of Supervisors. We have an opportunity to influence the direction and the scope of the Prop.

63 implementation because there are **nine** (9) vacancies on that Mental Health Advisory Committee. If you plan to apply for one of those vacancies, please let Barbara Jue know of your plans such that she may alert one of the Board members. Write her at her email address: jue-birdy@aol.com Include your city, County District number (if you know it), and a brief sketch of your background. AND, go ahead and make the application. Please note also that there are also two vacancies on the County's Human Relations Commission. This would be another great opportunity to get the LGBTQ agenda in front of local elected officials.
