Opposition to Gay Marriage Declining, Poll Finds

WASHINGTON (March 23) - The public backlash over gay marriage has receded since a controversial decision by the Massachusetts Supreme Court in 2003 to legalize those marriages stirred strong opposition, says a poll released Wednesday. Gay marriage remains a divisive issue with 51 percent opposing it, the poll by the Pew Research Center for the People and the Press found. But almost two-thirds, 63

percent, opposed gay marriage in February 2004.

"Most Americans still oppose gay marriage, but the levels of opposition are down and the number of strong opponents is down," said Andrew Kohut, director of the Pew Research Center. "This has some implications for the midterm elections if this trend is maintained. There are gay marriage ballot initiatives in numerous states." Gay marriage got intense media coverage in 2004 after the Massachusetts

court case, the decision by San Francisco Mayor Gavin Newsom to issue thousands of marriage licenses to gay couples and similar cases. But the intense focus on gay marriage has declined in the last year.

In 2004, opponents of gay marriage were able to pass ballot initiatives banning the practice in 11 states, from Georgia to Oregon. Those gay marriage initiatives also helped conservatives rally their voters to the polls.

The number of people who say they strongly oppose gay marriage has dropped from 42 percent in early 2004 to 28 percent now. Strong opposition has dropped sharply among senior citizens and Republicans. People are now evenly split on allowing adoptions by gay couples and six in 10 now favor allowing gays to serve openly in the military.

Legal challenges of laws on gay marriage could result in more court decisions that stir public opinion, but this midterm election year is starting with far less public anxiety about one of the nation's most volatile social issues.

The telephone poll of 1,405 adults was conducted March 8-12 and has a margin of sampling error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.

LGBT people often have particular needs when it comes to estate planning. Couples and families, for example, face complications because same-sex marriages are not legally recognized. LGBT people also have special opportunities, including opportunities to create meaningful and permanent legacies to support our community. 



May Book Review

The Velvet Rage: Overcoming the Pain of Growing up Gay in a Straight Man's World by Alan Downs, DaCapo - \$23.00

It is a truism that life for gays has vastly improved since most of us struggled through our stressful teen years. But for many of us, the inner struggles never completely heal. The chronic demos haunt us. The archetypical American father has rarely been close to his children, gay or straight. The mother tries to provide emotional support to compensate for this lack. I can vividly recall my own father nervously pushing me away whenever I sought out a warm hug. It was not part of the macho script.

Dr. Alan Downs, a clinical psychologist who hangs out his shingle in Santa Fe, New Mexico, explores this bewildering landscape by telling us that lavender liberation can only liberate us up to a point. There is emotional homework to untangle.

As gays and lesbians, we are taught by the culture not to trust our own instinct. Teenage romances rarely last more than a few years. Gays tend to use their twenties as a form of

free fall where they play the filed as an exercise in delayed adolescence. Somewhere in the more secure time of their thirties, they finally buy a house and get serious about the game of life.

Downs points out that these early alliances can be damaging when there is a lack of insight. First love is typically based on good looks and sexual attraction. After a string of failures, the individual concludes that fulfilling relationships will never come to pass. "Splitting" is a psychological defense used when a person presents a false front to the rest of the world and his or her true feelings are denied. As Downs elaborates, "It's about living dishonestly, faking an entire segment of our lives for the benefit of getting along in life."

Avoidance of shame is another trap that can drain life of rich interactions. Gays frequently marry a person of the opposite sex as a means of validating themselves. Misuse of sex occurs when a gay or lesbian uses eroticism as a means, not of relating, but simply to reduce stress.

Downs explores aging issues. He explores the tendency of older gay men to engage in high risk behavior, such as unprotected sex, because they would

die young rather than be old and lonely. I once encountered a man who wanted to die when he was forty rather than face the future.

Psychologist Downs concludes that, in a sense, we marry our parents as role models for future interactions. "Relationship hopelessness" occurs after a series of failed encounters. He concludes that we must learn to move on and ignore past mistakes. Learn from them. Over the years, in observing straight couples, I have witnessed a number of successful **second** marriages.

Dr. Downs leaves us with several parting shots:

Don't' use sex as a filter for potential friendships

Accept your body as it really is, not as a hopeless pursuit of the body beautiful

Don't always react emotionally

Confront the person causing the problem before talking to others

Dr. Downs has written several titles dealing with management issues but this is his first exploration of gay and lesbian conflicts. The reader will find a rich collection of insights here and all of us will be intrigues by what he has to offer.




