

LGBT ELDER HOUSING: A HALF-CENTURY-OLD DREAM IS BE-COMING A REALITY

In the past couple of years, plans to create housing for LGBT older adults have drawn increasing coverage in the queer and general-distribution media. Few have noted, however, that the LGBT community has been dreaming about such housing for at least half a century. Fifty years ago this spring, the first article mentioning the topic appeared in a pioneering publication of the so-called homophile movement: In its April-May 1956 issue, One Magazine reported on the founding of a short-lived gay institution, the Church of One Brotherhood in Los Angeles. The ambitious program of the new congregation included building the "City of David Apartments and Recreation Center for the Aged."

The elder housing project of the Church of One Brotherhood never came to fruition -- and a number of similar proposals from other developers in succeeding decades likewise failed to make it off the drawing board. Today, however, it turns out that those mid-century dreamers from Southern California and their visionary descendants were on to something: The first full-fledged retirement community for LGBT elders in the United States has opened its doors in Santa Fe, and the first U.S. nonprofit multifamily housing for LGBT elders has broken ground -- fittingly enough, in Los Angeles. Here's a quick update on some of the promising projects that LGAIN members are working on:

Rainbow Vision, a for-profit development in Santa Fe, is holding its grand-opening celebration on June 11. The first phase of the 146-unit retirement community is complete, buyers who reserved condominiums in advance have moved in, and both independent living and assisted living units are available for lease. In addition, a restaurant, a spa and salon, and a fitness center have opened their doors on the 12.7-acre site. For more information, visit http://www.rainbowvisionprop.com

Encore Hall, a project of the nonprofit Gay and Lesbian Elder Housing in Los Angeles, is under construction in Hollywood, just a few blocks from the Los Angeles Lesbian and Gay Community Center. Set to open in spring 2007, the four-story affordable housing facility will include 104 rental units, as well as a community space and retail shops. For more information, visit http://www.gleh.org.

Stonewall Communities, a nonprofit in Boston, and

Abbott Real Estate Development, a for-profit developer, recently acquired two adjoining lots in Boston's Fenway neighborhood. The partnership plans to develop a 66-unit condominium complex for LGBT elders on the site. Nine of the units will be priced as affordable housing; all will be for sale. For more information, visit

Fountaingrove Lodge is set for construction on a 10-acre site in Santa Rosa, Calif. Developed by the for-profit Aegis Senior Living, the project is planned to be the first continuing care retirement community for LGBT elders anywhere in the world. The developer is awaiting final design approvals from local authorities and is already accepting refundable deposits for units. For more information, visit http://www.fountaingrovelodge.com.

openhouse, a San Francisco nonprofit, is planning 80 supportive housing units for LGBT elders a few blocks from the San Francisco LGBT Community Center. The project is a partnership with A. F. Evans, a for-profit firm working to build a larger retirement community on a former campus of the University of California Extension. openhouse is currently asking community members to urge city officials to approve the A. People with Disabilities. Find a buddy. If you need help to live independently, make sure someone is checking up on you daily. This may be your neighbor, your child, your Meals on Wheels driver, your Telecare phone volunteer, your Friendly Visitor, but SOMEONE needs to be there for you. Assemble a Disaster Supplies Kit Several flashlights (By the bed and around the house, electricity may be out) Battery operated radio and extra batteries Bottled water for 5 days, 5 gallons, (1 gallon per person, per day; include a small bottle of bleach) Non perishable, ready to eat food for 5 days (Dried fruit, canned tuna, stew, beans, canned fruit juices. nuts, crackers, etc.) Manual can opener First Aid Kit (Include a First Aid Handbook, gauze, bandages, disinfectants, etc.) Wrench for gas turn-off (Use only if you or someone else smells gas) Whistle or loud bell (To attract attention if trapped) Extra prescription medications to last for 5 days (Also, copy of prescriptions) Emergency Health Information Card (Include a list of current prescription) Extra set of clothing, a sturdy pair of shoes, a blanket (The blanket clothing can be used to keep warm and the sturdy pair of shoes can be used in the event that they may need to walk a distant that is greater than what they are accustomed to, and/or they have a comfortable pair of shoes in a central location without a need to search for them). For Persons Using a Wheelchair: Discuss lifting or carrying techniques necessary to get down stairs. There may be instances where wheelchair users will need to leave their chairs behind in order to evacuate safely. For Persons who are Blind or Visually Impaired Put an extra collapsible cane by the bed. Attach a whistle to the cane to use to attract attention. After an earthquake items may fall and block paths that are normally unobstructed. Guide dogs or working dogs may also be disoriented after a big disaster. For Persons who are Deaf or Hearing Impaired Consider storing hearing aids in a container attached to your night stand or bed post, so you can quickly locate them after a disaster. Keep an extra hearing aid and batteries with emergency supplies. For Persons who use Life-Support Systems Secure all vital equipment. Maintain a current list of alternate providers. Consider an alternate power source, such as a generator. Know how to use oxygen safely in an emergency. Regularly test backup power supply. 



July Book Review

Covering: The Hidden Assault On Our Civil Rights

By Kenji Yoshino Norton -\$24.95

The marketplace is currently flooded with well meaning books on coming out, how to deal with the family, employers' reactions and public reaction. But Kenji Yoshino now raises new questions and a fresh perspective. He wonders if emerging from the shadows whole hog is always a sound strategy. He offers what he calls covering. The concept seems to shape up in the form of,"Be gay, but don't flaunt it, don't hide it, but play it down."

Yoshino is indebted to the social scientist Erving Goffman, who explored the area of stigma. Our lives are significantly influenced by the opinions of those around us and we tend to create an elaborate shield to protect ourselves from pain and exposure.

But Kenji is not a scientist of any sort. He is a professor of law at Yale University. He conducts classes on sexuality and the law and the law and literature. He is not your run of the

mill mentor of the rule books. His family possessed an impressive academic background. His father came from Japan, attended Columbia University and received a doctorate degree in economics. Kenji's mother was also well educated. Kenji is a Rhodes Scholar.

The author applies his vision of coming out as a general principle that can be applied to all minority groups. He cites the compelling example of Franklin Roosevelt, who fought throughout his professional career to artfully conceal his polio handicap. He would never allow the public to see him in a wheelchair. Always go with your strength and not your weakness.

Yoshino argues for universal liberation, but this can be easily watered down into a lot of meaningless platitudes that lack staying power in the political arena. But he also points out that we all have something to hide in our private lives.

After covering the lavender side of the spectrum Kenji moves on to the implications of his Japanese heritage. His parents took Kenji and his sister to Japan each summer. They soon learned that the Japanese do not consider you truly a part of their culture unless you are raised in their culture. Kenji expresses the dilemma well when he says, "I passed Japanese language but I flunked Japanese race."

Other areas of subtle "covering" are considered.

Women are often advised to tone down their assertiveness or blacks are counseled to dress in a conservative manner.

Covering is an eye opening read for any intelligent observer. We are now entangled in a confusing mass of

contradictory messages about how to survive in today's fast moving world. Yoshino helps us sort out some of the complex issues that only the passage of time can resolve .-Frank Howell


