CELEBRATING AGING IN PLACE WEEK OCTOBER 1-7!

In 2007 Lavender Seniors was responsible for having the Mayor's of San Leandro, Hayward, Alameda, and San Francisco declare the first week of October as Aging in Place week in their cities. Aging in Place Week is again upon us and Lavender Seniors is hosting our annual symposium with vendor fair and free health checks on Friday October 3, from 10am to 1pm, at the Marina Community Center, 15301 Wicks Blvd in San Leandro. The purpose of this important week and event is to inspire seniors to create a plan for living longer at home. Attendees of the symposium will get a chance to listen to experts and ask questions about products and services that can help prolong the need for nursing homes. Avoiding the need for nursing homes requires careful consideration of home modification, in-home care, health and wellness, injury prevention, mobility, communications, security, insurance and finance. Aging in Place planning also requires engaging loved ones in the discussion. Family, friends, and neighbors can play a critical role in helping seniors live at home. They are vital for preparing our communities for the "silver tsunami" which will create a demand for more inhome support services in the coming decades. A big thank you goes out to our event sponsor Kaiser as well as the City of San Leandro's Senior Services and to all our community event partners that are working together to help our seniors live longer at home!

Aging in Place Tips

Typically individuals plan for college, careers, parenting, and vocations, etc. But not for the inevitable mobility and sight issues they may have to contend with in older life. When considering "Aging-in-Place," it is best to be proactive, and start as early as possible. It is unfortunate that many seniors wait until they've had a fall, or are hospitaized

before they begin a pre-plan. When denying the inevitable changes in our bodies, we are truly planning for failure.

If you want to maximize your chances of living at home until you are 100+, I recommend you have an assessment of your living environment by a professional. I also recommend you familiarize yourself with the newest and latest services available from your local community based facilities. With both of those tools, you will be able to create a realistic plan for "Aging-in-Place." Dorothy L. (Del) Martin

(May 5, 1921 - August 27, 2008)

An eloquent organizer for civil rights, civil liberties, and human dignity, Del Martin created and helped shape the modern lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender (LGBT) and feminist movements. She was a woman of extraordinary courage, persistence, intelligence, humor, and fundamental decency, who refused to be silenced by fear and never stopped fighting for equality.

Del Martin met the love of her life, Phyllis Lyon, in Seattle in 1950 when they worked for the same publication company. They became lovers in 1952 and formalized their partnership on Valentine's Day in1953 when they moved in together in San Francisco. In 1955, they bought the small home that has been theirs ever since.

Del will be missed by all.

Brad Pitt donates to marriage fight

Conservative group fights utility contribution.

Actor Brad Pitt has donated \$1000,000 to the group fighting a proposed amendment to the California constitution to ban gay marriage.

Pitt's donation to "No on 8" is the largest to date by a major celebrity. Gay rights supporters say they hope it encourages other A-List stars to follow.

In a statement. Pitt said he was contributing to the fight against the proposed amendment "because no one has the right to deny another their life, even though they disagree with it, because everyone has the right to live the life they so desire if it doesn't harm another and because discrimination has no place in America, my vote will be for equality and against Proposition 8."

A similar check from the state's biggest utility has raised the ire of conservatives.

The head of the Pacific justice Institute has filed a complaint with the California Public Utilities commission over the \$250,000 contribution by Pacific Gas and electric Company to the group fighting to maintain the right for gays to marry.

PG&E turned the check over to "NO on 8" in July.

"It is outrageous that a mammoth utility used my money to undermine the values of families in my community," said Brad Dacus, who is the president of the Pacific Justice Institute.

"Proposition 8 has no relevance to the supply and distribution of energy services to its customers. As a corporation which has been given near monopoly status, its use of money extracted from customers to influence an item appearing on the ballot that does not promote the welfare of customers relative to energy is an abuse of trust," the complaint states.

It asks the Public Utilities Commission to conduct an investigation and hold hearings as to the lawfulness of the contribution. In addition, the complaint requests that the "Commission take all appropriate actions to remedy this matter, including fines, available under the law."

Under the California constitution, the commission has the power to conduct such an inquire.

Legislation Action

Senate Bill 1729, authored by Sen. Carole Migden, D-San Francisco, would ensure that health care providers in nursing homes are properly trained on how to create an environment that is free from bias against LGBT seniors. The bill would help guarantee that LGBT seniors can age with social support and respect.

Senate Bill 153, also authored by Sen. Migden, would allow two people, including same-gender couples, who coown a home together to avoid an unfair property tax increase upon the death of one co-owner. The bill would protect unmarried LGBT seniors who may otherwise be at risk of losing their homes during their time of grief.

These bills are critical to the future of every LGBT Californian. <u>Please write the Appropriations Committee members today</u> to let them know that all seniors deserve dignity and fairness, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

Oct Book Review

Bohemian Los Angeles and the Making of Modern Politics

By Daniel Hurewitz

University of California Press--Paperback

There has long been a tug of war between Northern California and our neighbors to the south. Each views itself as the cultural capitol of the Golden State. The present volume will probably do nothing to calm the controversy, but Hurewitz does present us with a compelling account of the characters that populate the land below us.

Of course there is the founding of the Mattachine Society and Harry Hay's courageous battle to establish gay rights as a solid force. But there are lesser known, but equally compelling figures such as Julian Eltinge, a wildly popular female impersonator during the early part of the 20th century. He first gained fame in New York in 1904 in The Crinoline Girl, where he played both the male and female roles. Two years later he was gaining fame in the City of the Angeles. He was known for wearing clothes that were the last word in fashion and impeccable taste. But

by the 1930s the crowds grew tired of him and he died during World War II almost totally forgotten.

Edendale emerged as the Castro Street of L. A., where artists and social outcasts flourished. A gay community slowly asserted itself in the 1930s and 1940s.

But the World War transformed the entire west coast, with a swarm of racial minority's pouring into the area in search of factory work. This created the Zoot Suit wars and ethnic tensions were difficult to ignore.

After the war, conservative voices lashed out against the lavender menace. The **Los Angeles Times** and other newspapers launched crusades against vice. Gays were viewed as somehow associated with communism. In 1938 Los Angeles established a sex bureau which employed three psychiatrists. Their basic attitude was that "each minor sex offender is a potential major sex criminal."

In the 1950s Hurewitz tells us that a subculture of hyper masculinity fought back against the "sissies". This would keep communism at bay! But the American Communist Party frequently expelled gays.

The Mattachine Society won a major victory when Dale Jennings, member of their group, won an entrapment case in the Los Angeles courts. Paul Coates, a noted news columnist warned, in discussing the influence of the Mattachine that, "they might swing tremendous political power." Ah, a prophet before his time! Mr. Hurewitz gives us a captivating and enthralling account of gay old Los Angeles that provides a number of little known historical sidelights. A compelling journey awaits the curious reader.
