The Little Things That Rankle

In 'Sweetie' and Dear,' A Hurt for the Elderly By John Leland

Published October 6, 2008 New York Times Excerpts

Elderspeak, a form of address that worms its way into conversations between generations, can send a message that older people are incompetent. It ranges from talking in a bullying tone, to addressing older people by their first names, to using condescending words or terms.

Professionals call it elderspeak because the sweetly belittling form of address has always rankled older people: the doctor who talks to their child rather than to them about their health; the store clerk who assumes that an older person does not know how to work a computer, or needs to be addressed slowly or in a loud voice. Then there are those who address any elderly person as "dear." "

People think they're being nice," said Elvira Nagle, 83, of

Dublin, Calif., "but when I hear it, it raises my hackles."

Now studies are finding that the insults can have health consequences, especially if people mutely accept the attitudes behind them, said Becca Levy, an associate professor of epidemiology and <u>psychology</u> at <u>Yale University</u>, who studies the health effects of such messages on elderly people.

"Those little insults can lead to more negative images of aging," Dr. Levy said. "And those who have more negative images of aging have worse functional health over time, including lower rates of survival."

In a long-term survey of 660 people over age 50 in a small

North County.



Volunteer Story of the Month

Working on Legislative Bills-It is important to try to influence the course of events in our state capitol. This summer Dan Ashbrook and I testified on behalf of bill 1729 before two different committees in Sacramento. The bill was signed by the governor authorizing organizations like Lavender Seniors to provide Cultural Competency Training for medical personnel who work with LGBT senior citizens. It is vital that they be sensitive to the needs and feelings of people in our community. They need to be aware of our needs. The bill was introduced by assembly- woman Carol Migden. Cultural Competency Training involves a panel of gay, lesbian and transgender people (usually four in numbers) to meet with social workers, doctors, and others who interact with LGBT clients in senior citizen homes and community centers. We each tell our personal stories and Dan explains the functions of Lavender Seniors.

Another enlightening experience for me has been serving on the Alameda Commission on Aging which meets on a monthly basis in Oakland. The commission offers the opportunity to serve on three different committees: public relations, health and safety, and legislative affairs. I serve on two of the committees.

The public relations group is chiefly concerned with producing a guarterly news letter known as the Senior Update. This provides articles of interest to the older population about health, political and social developments.

The health and safety committee sponsors and produces each year a health fair at Centennial Hall in Hayward. The elderly are bussed in from all over Alameda County where they are treated to lunch, entertainment, and testing stations where qualified medical specialists can check for any medical conditions like diabetes or heart disease. Last year over 900 people attended.

The legislative committee keeps a steady eye on what goes on in Sacramento and meets with assembly people and state senators about bills affecting the grey haired set. -Frank Howell

Ohio town, published in 2002, Dr. Levy and her fellow researchers found that those who had positive perceptions of aging lived an average of 7.5 years longer, a bigger increase than that associated with exercising or not smoking. The findings held up even when the researchers controlled for differences in the participants' health conditions.

In her forthcoming study, Dr. Levy found that older people exposed to negative images of aging, including words like "forgetful," "feeble" and "shaky," performed significantly worse on memory and balance tests; in previous experiments, they also showed higher levels of stress.

Despite such research, the worst offenders are often health care workers, said Kristine Williams, a nurse gerontologist and associate professor at the <u>University of Kansas</u> School of Nursing. Health care workers are often not trained to avoid elderspeak, said Vicki Rosebrook, the executive director of the Macklin Intergenerational Institute in Findlay, Ohio, a combined facility for elderly people and children that is part of a retirement community.

Dr. Rosebrook said that even in her facility, "we have 300 elders who are 'sweetie'd' here. Our kids talk to elders with more respect than some of our professional care providers."

In the meantime, people who are offended might do well to follow the advice of Warren Cassell of Portland, Ore., who said it irritated him when "teenage store clerks and about 95 percent of the rest of society" called him by his first name. "It's the faux familiarity," said Mr. Cassell, 78. But he mostly shrugs it off, he said. "I'm irked by it, but I can't think about it that much," he said. "There are too many more important things to think about."

Jury Duty Scam

This has been verified by the FBI (their link is also included below). Please pass this on to everyone in your email address book. It is spreading fast so be prepared should you get this call. Most of us take those summonses for jury duty seriously, but enough people skip out on their civic duty, that a new and ominous kind of fraud has surfaced. The caller claims to be a jury coordinator. If you protest that you never received a summons for jury duty, the scammer asks you for your Social Security number and date of birth so he or she can verify the information and cancel the arrest warrant. Give out any of this information and bingo; your identity was just stolen.

The fraud has been reported so far in 11 states, including Oklahoma, Illinois, and Colorado. This (swindle) is particularly insidious because they use intimidation over the phone to try to bully people into giving information by pretending they are with the court system. The FBI and the federal court system have issued nationwide alerts on their web sites, warning consumers about the fraud. Check it out here:

Senior Caregivers to receive LGBT training

Excerpts (San Francisco, CA)

A new law, SB1729, signed by California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger will help prevent bias in senior care facilities and nursing homes.

Basic rights, such as the choice to live in the same nursing home with a partner and the right to hospital visitation are routinely denied to same gender couples in older age, according to a 2000 study from the Policy Institute of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force.

"No senior should be denied the care they need or forced to face indignities because of their sexual orientation or gender identity," said Sen. Carole Migden (D-San Francisco) who authored the legislation.

The law will go into effect on January 1, 2009

Nov Book Review

The Transgender Child

A handbook for Families and Professionals by Stephanie Brill and Rachel Pepper Cleis Press

With laws changing and science and medicine learning new facts about human development every year, this is a very useful guide for people dealing with transgender children. It provides a focused look at the issues within and outside of the family. It addresses the needs of the family as well as transgendered child. It provides practical and well thought out insight to all of the people whose lives are impacted.

I was initially wondering what this guide book had to offer that was new. In the early chapters it seems all very practical and down to earth. All of the concepts are very common sense approach. But as I progressed to the later chapters it was clear that this was up to date with current laws, current issues about what is happening in families, the schools and society of today.

Social values and laws are changing rapidly as relates to transgendered as well as gay and lesbian children and teens. This morning I was at a local high school and their main interest was in debating Proposition 8 on the upcoming ballot. Quite a change within just the last 8 years.

As a guide book, this has a very specific target. However, I think the concepts apply to all families encountering difficult issues. It stresses how to appreciate the views of others without allowing abusive situations to develop.

When I reached the end, I was very impressed how this book had stressed respect and love within the family. How it had provided up to date material on many of the legal changes in society. And on many of the changes in medical options available for transgendered children. This really is a handbook relevant to today.

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
