Camp Courage Event Held in Oakland

S.F. DYKE MARCH - 2009


The Midtown Ballroom in Oakland was a lively and stimulating place on May 2nd and May 3rd where over 350 eager volunteers gathered for an intensive training program on how to campaign against Proposition 8.

Those participating were divided into groups of seven and practiced their interviewing skills to use when canvassing neighborhoods in small towns. We were trained on how to tell our own personal stories to people we meet. Too often lavender groups have turned to famous straight people in the media to speak for us. Now gay families must express their own unique thoughts and feelings.

It is unfortunate that only a handful of gay seniors were present for the training. The majority of those attending were in their 20s, 30s and 40s.

Everyone was urged to travel to Fresno on the Saturday immediately following the California Supreme Court decision on Proposition 8. This will be the only statewide demonstration. There will now be a massive attempt to communicate with the rural populations of California.

Senior/disabled viewing stand will be in front of Sha'ar Zahar at 16th & Dolores; chairs, refreshments and portapotties will be set up by 6:00pm,

Senior/disabled parking garage and shuttle: Free parking starting at 2pm and a shuttle with wheelchair lift will be available at the Hoff St. Garage (off 16th, ½ block from the 16th st. bart).

Shuttle service from the Hoff Street Garage to Dolores park will run between 2pm and 4pm for free. Shuttle service from the park to Sha'ar Zahav will run from 5:30-6:30pm. After the march passes the viewing stand, there will be 3 or 4 shuttles, as needed, from Sha'ar Zahav to the garage.

VOLUNTEER CORNER

I decided to write the volunteer corner this month as my volunteer work outside of the day to day management of Lavender Seniors is the inspiration behind doing this work. Through my volunteer work I get the opportunity to see a part of the LGBT community that is often invisible. LGBT Seniors who are homebound, in nursing homes, suffering from dementia and Alzheimer's, or just lonely and wanting to stay connected to a community. For the past 3 years I have had the experience of visiting a man who lives alone with dementia, visiting seniors in nursing homes, and helping other volunteers to provide this invaluable service. The man I visit with dementia has a remarkable story. Keep in mind he has only two living relatives and both live out of state. Typically someone with his level of dementia and a lack of family support would require assisted living or nursing home care. But this gentleman prefers to live in the comforts of his own apartment. He has been able to do this because I have kept him connected to a social network consisting of old friends and an inhome support service worker through the county. I keep the network as cohesive as possible by hosting regular gatherings and facilitating ongoing communications between all parties. Even though each day brings about new challenges for this man, his social network provides ongoing relief. The synergy of this network fosters hope and a sense of belonging for someone who is greatly at risk of health disparities brought about by isolation and depression. It also provides relief because he fears loosing his apartment and most of his belongings to a nursing home. His apartment and belongings are a big part of his identity as they provide memories of friends and family even though his memory maybe weakening. It is amazing how much of a profound difference the simplest things in life such as regular visits and phone calls from friends can make in the life of an at-risk senior. Because of this experience I feel that if frail seniors are able to find a way to maintain a social network, they can age at home with dignity and respect. It is up to each one of us to see to it that our frail senior loved ones have a social network. I often wonder how much we could save in health care costs by assuring that all seniors in our community who are frail, disabled, or homebound have a thriving social network.

DYKE MARCH HISTORY

Dyke March is a mostly <u>lesbian</u>-led and inclusive gathering and <u>protest march</u> much like the original <u>gay pride parades</u> and marches. They usually occur the Friday or Saturday before LGBT Pride Parades and larger metropolitan areas have related events (parties, benefits, dances) both before and after the event to further develop community relationships. The purpose of a Dyke March is to increase lesbian visibility and <u>activism</u> and they have grown to be more inclusive of all women-loving-women regardless of labels as well as <u>bisexuals</u>, <u>intersex</u> and <u>transgender</u> persons.

SAN FRANCISCO

The first <u>San Francisco</u> Dyke March was held a few months later, in June 1993, and is still celebrated every year on the Saturday evening before the annual Pride Parade. The Dyke March is informal, with marchers creating their own signs and most people showing up to participate, rather than to just watch. The streets along the March route are lined with thousands of enthusiastic spectators, mostly gay men in support of the women. The march begins in <u>Dolores Park</u> with speeches, performances and community networking and ends in the <u>Castro District</u>, at the <u>Pink Saturday</u> party where the Dyke March sound-truck becomes a stage for more performances, DJs and more speakers. The San Francisco Dyke March is attended by well over 200,000 people yet remains a peaceful and well-organized event.



A powerful new production, "Ask Not" will air on KQED Channel 9 on June 26th. The film was previewed on April 30th at Metropolitan Community Church in San Francisco to an enthusiastic audience. Three ex-service people spoke of their experience, including Rev. Lea Brown, pastor of MCC.

The producer of the film answered questions from the audience.

During the course of the narration Bill Clinton expressed regret for signing the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," bill. He believed it constituted an honorable compromise. But the purpose of the legislation was seriously compromised by the Pentagons determination to root out LGBT soldiers at any cost.-Frank Howell



June Book Review

Unfriendly Fire: How the Gay Ban Undermines the Military and Weakens America

By Nathaniel Frank, St. Martins Press-\$25.95

The issue of gays in the military has finally reached a crossroad. The usual rationalizations are growing threadbare and the public attitude has shifted in significant ways. During World War II the psychiatric view of gays as weak and ineffective took firm root. Over the years a parade of comprehensive studies by organizations, including the highly respected Rand Corporation, declared that denying gay and lesbian soldiers entry into the armed forces was senseless. But the studies were either buried or ignored. The Pentagon tradition ruled with a firm hand.

Bill Clinton now frankly regrets signing the "don't ask, don't tell" policy into law. He had no idea of the way the policy could be sabotaged and gays and lesbians would be investigated and forced to leave the armed forces. During the time the controversy erupted in Congress, the powers that be simply stacked the deck and all contrary evidence was ignored. The macho ethic carried the day.

Some 24 countries now welcome lavender recruits into their first lines of defense. Dire predictions of demoralization proved groundless.

The British military now openly advertise in the annual gay parades in London. They openly recruit gays. Israel, one of the most respected military forces in the world, has no problem with queer folk.

In America 12,342 gay and lesbian soldiers have been separated from the services. This represents a cost to taxpayers of \$364 million dollars.

Gays and lesbians are unable to take advantage of conventional assistance such as psychiatric consultation. The commanding officer would be immediately notified. Even military chaplains are required to follow the rules. Gays are on their own. Many decide not to re-enlist. Some 300 critically needed language specialists were lost.

Tremendous pressure is put on military recruiters to pull in every warm body available. Drug addicts, ex-convicts, and other mentally types are accepted into our armed forces, but not gays and lesbians.

80% of Americans polled favor abolishing these restrictions. In some units gays are accepted and casually tolerated. Much depends on the commanding officer and his attitudes.

The Military Readiness Act, introduced by Marty Meehan, now has 140 co-sponsors in Congress.

Nathaniel Frank brings exceptional qualities to his penetrating investigation of this critical issue. He received his M. A. and PhD in history at Brown University. He currently serves as a senior research fellow at the University of California in Santa Barbara, at the Palm Center. His research findings have been cited on the floor of Congress.

It's time Congress pays heed to the voice of Frank on this vital public issue. The time is long past due. Our security needs demand it.

LGBT HISTORY

Fannyann Viola Eddy (1974-2004)

Fannyann Viola Eddy was an activist for <u>lesbian</u> and <u>gay</u> rights in her native <u>Sierra Leone</u> and throughout Africa. In 2002, she founded the <u>Sierra Leone Lesbian and Gay Association</u>, the first of its kind in Sierra Leone. She traveled widely, addressing the <u>United Nations</u> and other international groups. In April 2004, she advocated the passing of the <u>Brazil Resolution</u> on Human Rights and Sexual Orientation at the UN in <u>Geneva</u>.

On the night of September 29, 2004, she was killed in the groups Freetown Pademba Road office while working alone.

In her address to the Commission on Human Rights in Africa she stressed the point that "lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender communities do exist throughout Africa and on every continent. Human rights violations based on sexual orientation or gender identity are committed every day. Many African leaders do not want to acknowledge this fact, which has caused many disastrous results for their communities."

Fannyann further stated that "Many African Americans fear that if their sexual orientation or gender identity is known, especially the youth, they will be disowned by their families with no place to go, thus becoming homeless and resorting to sex work in order to survive. When African leaders use culture, tradition, religion and societal norms to deny our existence, they send a message that tolerates discrimination, violence and overall indignity."

FannyAnn Eddy was a person of extraordinary bravery and integrity, who literally put her life on the line for human rights. She left behind her son and her partner Esther Chikalipa.

When we advocate for Human Rights in our communities, this can lead people to understand that in the end, we are all human and are entitled to respect and dignity.

Remember "silence creates vulnerability."
