Hate Crimes Prevention Aging In Place Speakers

Matthew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act (S.909)

This legislation was designed to expand a 1969 U.S. federal hate-crime law by extending its scope to include bodily crimes against persons perceived gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, or disability. This bill was also introduced in the 110th Congress by Senators Kennedy [D,MA] and Gordon Smith [R,OR] in 2007 which died in committee but approved by a voice vote as an amendment to the Department of Defense State Reauthorization bill (H.R. 1585). This amendment was dropped by antiwar Democrats, conservative groups, and former President George W. Bush. President Obama has indicated that he aims to see this version of the bill passed.

The companion legislation, H.R. 1913, passed the House Vote on April 28, 2009. This became the Mathew Shepard Hate Crimes Prevention Act which adopts the definition of a hate crime as set forth in the Violent Crime control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994. Those are crimes in which the defendant intentionally selects a victim or a victim's property because of race, color, religion, sexual orientation, national origin, disability, gender, or ethnicity. On July 23, the Senate passed the Department of Defense Authorization bill which adopted the Mathew Sheppard Act. Some lawmakers are now pushing for the death penalty to be added to the DOD bill which undermines the Mathew Sheppard Act as the death penalty has been shown to exacerbate race and class bias. LGBT advocacy groups such as the National Center for Lesbian rights have been asking their constituents to urge removal of the death penalty amendment from the hate crimes bill provision by calling there local congressional senator or representative.

DADT (Don't Ask, Don't Tell)

This has been a busy time for gay rights movements and most of the news has been bad.

The Supreme Court has refused to review the Federal Court decision upholding Don't Ask, Don't Tell. It's a move that was not unexpected, and may save gay service members from a bad high court precedent, but it lets the decision that DADT has a rational basis stand as the current law.

As Washington stalls on repealing "don't ask, don't tell," a recent Cornell University study confirms what many people had assumed: "DADT" isn't just bad for gay people; it's bad for the military as well.

North County.



National Center for Lesbian Rights Produces Elder Law Manual Planning With Purpose – Legal Basics for LGBT Elders

LGBT elder's continue to be invisible in a growing population of seniors. As LGBTs age they can encounter barriers such as discriminatory policies, lack of legal protections, and institutional services or programs that do not recognize their families. This can result in a denial of rights, most commonly the survivor benefits available to heterosexual married couples. To address these legal issues and to motivate LGBT seniors to take a pro-active approach to protecting themselves, The National Center for Lesbian Rights has just released, Planning With Purpose - Legal Basics for LGBT Seniors. The manual is available at www.nclrights.org, under the links, issue cases, publications and downloads. Planning With Purpose provides important information pertaining to LGBT individuals or couples who are age 55 and older in the areas of relationships, finances, health care, care of minor or disabled children, long term care, elder abuse and neglect, estate planning and inheritance, and hiring attorneys. The guide also notes specific considerations for transgender persons. One important recommendation for all LGBT seniors noted in the manual is whether single or in a legally recognized relationship, it is important to speak with an attorney to help you understand and protect yourself from the legal aspects of aging as an LGBT. CA Budget Updates

California Budget Update on Senior Programs:

The governor signed a revised budget on July 28 for the 09-10 fiscal year. This budget still remains up in the air as legislative leaders question the legalities and legal actions to block cuts are in the works.

Adult Day Health Care - Program participation is capped at 3 days per week Some accommodations will be made for those at highest risk; In-Home Support Services (IHSS) - Domestic services will be cut based on functional indexes below 2 and below 4; The Public Authority which provides and administers senior support services will have funding cut by 60%; Supplemental Security Income (SSI/SSP) - a 3rd cut in 2009 of \$5 a month for individual recipients and a reduction to the minimum level for couples; Linkages- A program to provide care a management for frail adults has been eliminated. Linkages is run by the City of Oakland and they are working to find other funding sources; Senior Companion Program- All funding eliminated but the program will not completely close. The budget also eliminates funding for California's 36 Alzheimer's Day Care Resource Centers, Brown Bag food programs, and reduced state funding for Medi-Cal by \$323.2 million and a \$1 billion cut upon receipt of increased federal funds. The budget does adopt the Governor's proposal to "improve care coordination for vulnerable Medi-Cal populations," including seniors and people with disabilities. In-addition, the Governor used his line item veto to eliminate all state funding for community clinics, cut \$35.1 million to Rural Health Services, the Indian Health Program and Expanded Access to Primary Care program, and suspend a 2009 5% cost of living increase for skilled nursing facilities. Local Property Tax and redevelopment dollars totaling over \$3.9 billion will be shifted away from cities and counties which will also weaken our local government's ability to meet local needs.

Tips on Improving Patient-Practitioner Communications From the American Geriatrics Society's Foundation for Health in Aging, New York, NY

Before Your appointment

- -Make a List of all medications you have taken and the reactions you have had that caused unpleasant or dangerous side effects. If you are sick, write down all your symptoms and any questions you may have about your health.
- -Bring all medications, vitamins, over the counter medications, and any other herbal medicines you have taken.
- **-Pack paper.** Bring paper or a notebook so that you can write down information given to you by your practitioner.
- -Consider asking a buddy along. A family member or a friend should accompany you so that they can offer information that you might forget and help you to remember what your practitioner says.
- -Ask Questions. If you don't understand what your practitioner tells you during your visit, ask questions for clarification of instructions..
- -Repeat back the instructions that you are given to be sure that you understand them.
- -Ask for written instructions. If the practitioners name is on the written instructions, you can refer to them at any time and know that they are the right instructions.

50+ Co-housing

Establishing a Healthy, Sustainable Lifestyle for an Aging Generation by Chuck Durrett

Last year Americans drove 5 billion miles caring for seniors in their homes (Meals on Wheels, Whistle Stop Nurses, and so on). In our small, semi-rural county in the Sierra foothills, Telecare made 60,000 trips in massive, lumbering, polluting vans-buses - usually carrying only one senior at a time schlepping a couple thousand seniors total over hill and dale to doctor's appointments, to pick up medicine, or to see friends. In our co-housing community of 21 seniors, I have never seen a single Telecare bus in the driveway. In cohousing it happens organically by caring neighbors: "Can I catch a ride with you?"; "Are you headed to the drug store?", etc. And this alternative is much more fun and inexpensive for all involved, and much less damaging to the environment. Wolf Creek Lodge, a new senior co-housing community about to start construction, has 30 units to be built on 1 acre within walking distance of downtown Grass Valley, population 12,000. Top of mind, one future household will be moving from a 20 acre lot, 9 miles from town, another from 15 acres, also 9 miles out of town, and another from 13 acres, 7 miles from town. These are young seniors planning not only to live more sustainable, but more fulfilling as well.

Bill Thomas, M.D. and prominent author on issues affecting seniors, describes our currently predominant scenario of caring for seniors as the "\$3 trillion dollar dilemma." The cost of care for the 78 million new senior/baby boomers "coming of age" in the next 20 years will be \$3 trillion dollars more per year than it is now (and that is in a nation with a \$13 trillion dollar GDP – so that's a chunk of change). It goes without saying, that the current pattern is not sustainable from an environmental, cultural or financial point of view.

President Obama has announced that for us to arrest global warming; we will have to reduce carbon emissions by 2% per year until 2050. It seems doable, but last year, carbon emissions increased by 1.4% — we are headed in the wrong direction. Given this situation, we've got to do something. We need to think collectively about how to set seniors up for success and to help them achieve their full potential into their last 20-30 years. Co-housing is for seniors who want to be a part of the solution.

We can help seniors fulfill their desires for a more rewarding living arrangement that better supports their well being, physically, socially and emotionally. And the good news is that I haven't witnessed anyone having more fun since the college dorms, than seniors living in co-housing — and I've never seen anyone live more sustainable (my electric bill last year was minus \$83.84). Senior Co-housing: A Community Approach to Independent Living, second edition published by New Society Publishers — and the type of communities it describes and helps to create — allows seniors to live lightly on the planet and to enhance their quality of life at the same time.

Sep Book Review

Fellow Travelers By Thomas Mallon Random House-Paperback-\$14.95

Young gays and lesbians of today need to be reminded that there was once a dark era in American history when being or acting pink was cause for immediate lost of job and respectable standing in the community. This, of course, was the McCarthy period of the button down 1950s.

Thomas Mallon's 'Fellow Travelers' find gay romance in this era. Mallon has skillfully recreated the feelings and attitudes of the characters. Timothy Laughlin, a devout Catholic and dashing Department employee, and Hawkins Fuller, a Capitol Hill rookie working for the actual Sen. Charles Potter (R. Mich.. 1952-1959) who fall in love. Fuller is called in for a grilling by an FBI agent to determine if he fits the stereotype of gayness. He is asked to walk across the room and to read a passage from Maughams, "Of Human Bondage," to see if he is a little too swishy in his walk and tone of voice. Apparently Fuller passes the test and he is released from the

interrogation. A triumph of basic butchness!

There is also a curious scene where Tim confesses to a Catholic priest that he is attracted to men. No resolution there. Laughlin and Fuller finally realize their affair cannot work. Tim joins the army and Hawkins chooses marriage and the cloak of respectability.

Mallon sketches out the character of Senator Joseph McCarthy himself as he struggles with demon rum and tries to make a success of his marriage.

Mallon has written seven novels, including "Dewey Defeats Truman". "Fellow Travelers" will linger for a long time as our minds wander over the political past of the 20th century.

Mallon's portrait of an American past is memorable and not easy to forget.

Abuse On Rise

Elder Abuse on the Rise.

Because of the recession and budget cuts to social services, older Americans have been hit hard. They are becoming desperate, maybe too desperate for their survival and this causes them to be vulnerable to predators.

For example, an 86 year old woman opens her mail to find a solicitation for a reverse mortgage on her home. She calls the number listed and is connected to a salesman who assures her he can help her use the equity in her home to get the money she needs, The salesman helps her get a \$140.000 loan. He then persuades her to allow him to invest the money for her. That's the last time she hears from him and she has lost all of her equity money. The salesman is finally caught and brought to trial, sentenced and must repay the money. How long will that take? What will she live on until then?

Nation wide elder abuse is on the rise and because these crimes are underreported, no statistics comes close to telling the whole story.

Protecting against elder abuse is complicated for many reasons, not the least of which is that the accused is often someone the victim knows and loves. No amount of resources may be enough.

When victims have been beaten up by their circumstances, they're willing to accept help in whatever form. **BEWARE**


