Ina Mae Murri, January 15 1935 to July 17, 2010 Stella Lopez-Armijo, March 21, 1934 to July 17, 2010

It is with great sadness to announce that two pillars in the Lavender Seniors' community passed away within moments of each other on Saturday July 17, 2010 in South East Idaho near Preston. Ina Mae Murri and Stella Lopez-Armijo of Fremont were in Idaho for a family reunion. While on the road to the reunion after leaving their hotel, Ina Mae suffered a massive heart attack and died at the wheel. In a heroic and courageous act, Stella grabbed the wheel and drove into a pick-up truck to avoid pedestrians. Stella died en route to a hospital. Police say the driver of the pickup was transported to a hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

Ina and Stella were together for 35 years and pioneers in recognition for lesbian mothers as well as role models for the many in the LGBT community. Both were original founders of Lavender Seniors and Ina had been serving as a Lavender Seniors' Advisory Board member since the beginning. They were also very active in Women Over 50 and

Friends (WOFF) and Affirmation, an organization for Mormons who believe in the worth of every soul regardless of their sexual or gender orientation. I addition, Ina used to share her life story with health and human service providers as part of Lavender Seniors' cultural competency trainings. Both women were featured in the 1987 book by activist Cathy Cade, "A Lesbian Photo Album: The Lives of Seven Lesbian Feminists.

Ina will always be remembered for her compassionate and caring commitment to serving her community. She was once known for passing out cards that said, "You have been helped by a lesbian." Stella will always be remembered at Lavender Seniors for her sharp wit and humor. She always made people laugh hysterically with her jokes and outbursts at the San Leandro potlucks.

Bobbie Jarvis, Ina and Stella's long time friend and fellow Fremont resident says, "Stella & Ina loved comedians and drove from Santa Rosa to Los Angeles to see their favorites. Years ago when we first met, I was forever being surprised - you never knew who you were going to meet at their house - they had an open door policy for any one passing through Fremont who needed a place to spend the night and/or needed a meal. They enjoyed the Olivia Cruises (I think they had gone on 12 or 13 of the cruises!). They loved mingling with celebrities and were on a first name basis with many of them.

They added another wonderful dimension to our lives! We enjoyed sharing a meal, a movie, or a TV program with them. Ina had a large lending library of gay literature so sometimes we just sat around and read! When dining out, Stella always left the restaurant knowing everything about the waiter or waitress."

Ina and Stella are survived by children and grandchildren of previous marriages.

A funeral mass and reception is being held Friday July 30 at 10AM at the Transfiguration Catholic Church,

Photovoice Responds to Community Issues

Lavender Seniors was selected by Kaiser Permanente in July to implement Photovoice, a project that will address long-standing problems and emerging needs in Southern Alameda County. Photovoice has been referred to as "document photography" as it can best be described as a blend of a grassroots approach to photography and social action. The project utilized a team of volunteers who photographed issues such as unsafe streets, graffiti, and inaccessibility for the disabled in 3 sectors; neighborhoods, summer or school programs, and public recreation areas. The photographs will enable policy makers to make informed decisions about how to meet unmet needs of the greater south Alameda County area as well as guide Kaiser in future community improvement initiatives.

Road to a Healthy Heart

It's no secret that heart disease is America's #1 killer. According to the Centers for Disease Control, 631,636 people died of heart disease in 2006 and half of the deaths due to heart disease were women. What's more, every year about 785,000 Americans have a first heart attack; and another 470,000 who have already had one or more heart attacks have another attack.

Only a few of the risk factors of heart disease CANNOT be controlled--gender, age and family history. Whereas, many of the risk factors CAN be controlled or prevented, such as smoking, hypertension, high cholesterol, diabetes, lack of exercise, overweight/obesity, excessive alcohol and stress. A healthy lifestyle, specifically a healthy diet, is the common thread in lowering your risk for heart disease and may prevent current heart problems from worsening. Here are a few guidelines for a heart-healthy diet:

- 3 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 4 tablespoons honey
- 1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/8 tsp cayenne pepper
- 6 tangerines (or 5 naval oranges)
- 1 Hass avocado, halved, pitted, peeled, and thinly sliced crosswise
- 3 tablespoons roasted sunflower seeds

Preparation:

- -In a large bowl, whisk together lime juice, honey, balsamic vinegar, salt and cayenne pepper.
- -With a vegetable peeler, peel 3 long strips of zest from 1 tangerine. Cut the strips into 1/8-inch slivers. Then peel the tangerines and separate into segments. Cut the segments crosswise into 2-3 pieces, discarding any seeds.
- -Add the tangerines, zest and avocado to the dressing in the bowl and toss to combine. Chill until serving time.
- -Sprinkle with sunflower seeds.

Closet is Only Option

Closet the Only Option for Many Gay Seniors

The plight of many gay seniors is highlighted by the Chicago Tribune's profile of 85-year-old Victor Engandela, whose rich, challenging life journey has brought him to a seniors care facility in Evanston, Illinois, where he has been forced back into the closet:

"I always said when I retired, when it was no longer

dangerous, I was going to come out.' And that's what he did, retiring in the 1970s and telling everyone he knew, including members of the YMCA men's club where he was president, that he was gay. It felt good to finally be fully open, and he savored those years.

But now Engandela feels as closeted as he's ever been. He often sits alone in the dining room, and has little to do with the various groups and clubs at his long-term care facility. He has a friend who comes by twice a week. On Saturdays they sit in his room and listen to opera on the radio. Engandela has been to the seniors program at the Center on Halted a couple of times, but it's hard for him to arrange transportation. Once, another man from the nursing home took him, but when the man realized it was a gay organization he stormed off to the Center's lobby, refusing to dine with Engandela and the other seniors. 'At this point in my life, I can't believe I have to feel this way,' Engandela said. 'I have a lot of memories I'd like to share, a lot I'd like to talk about. But I feel like I can't, and I shudder when I think I have to spend the remaining years of my life in this place."

Aug Book Review

From Disgust to Humanity: Sexual Orientation & Constitutional Law

By Martha C. Nussbaum Oxford University Press-\$21.95 There are currently a backlog of titles on the familiar subject of same sex couples and their struggles for recognition. Many are now on the remainder tables in used book stores.

But Martha Nussbaum, Professor of Law and Ethics at the University of Chicago confronts us with a novel thesis: The backlash against gay affection is based on what she has powerfully identified as the "politics of disgust." In the overheated debates of the 1950s, Lord Patrick Devlin referred to "the disgust of the average member of society was a sufficient reason to make a practice illegal, even if it caused no harm to non-consenting third parties." Leon Kass, chairman of President Bush's Council on Bioethics, employees the same "disgust argument." He goes on to observe that "disgust thus contains a 'wisdom' that lies beneath all rational argument."

Nussbaum counters with the politics of humanity. That is, we use the imagination to

appreciate the other person's situation.

She then makes a crucial distinction between projective disgust vs. objective disgust. Classic examples of disgust psychology are anti-Semitism or racial prejudice. Objective disgust is scientific and precise. Tobacco smoking comes to mind.

John Stuart Mill saw a zone of freedom that could surround the individual "in order to work out their own course in life."

The sodomy laws that were recently declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court challenged the whole premise of the ancient laws. Typically the state regulations were quite vague, ill defined and wrapped in highly emotional language.

Violence against gays receives an indirect sign of approval from society. One police officer boasted that he had beaten up seventeen gay men. Nussbaum's basic thesis is that the state should withdraw from marriage completely and offer only civil unions. This avoids a host of messy and complicated issues like tax laws and conflicts between the various states.

Our professor makes a compelling argument against the social damage belief when she observes that in Massachusetts and Connecticut where gay marriage is legal, the divorce rates are among the lowest in the nation. In the Bible belt of the South there are high rates of divorce among fundamentalist Christians.

Thus, we need to rid ourselves of the politics of disgust and replace it with a society of inclusion and freedom.

Navratilova and Jana Novotna beat Tracy Austin and Kathy Rinaldi-Stunkel 7-5, 6-0 in the final on Court One.



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
