Aging in Place October 5!

There is a lot of confusion about how the Affordable Care Act will impact seniors. Many seniors are asking, Will my doctor change? Will my health insurance change? What does this mean for people on Medi-Cal or those that receive benefits through Medicare and Medi-Cal? What do I need to do? This year's Aging in Place, A Symposium and Resource Fair for Older Adults will address those questions with presentations by the Department of Health and Human Services District 9 in San Francisco and the Senior Service Coalition of Alameda County. This is one of the few opportunities to be able to ask these important questions directly to the policy experts working on these issues everyday. Aging in Place will also feature a panel of volunteer advocates with experience working on longterm care issues, Donna Christner-Lile author of Aging in Place, city officials, resource tables, prize drawings, refreshments, a performance by Stagebridge Senior Theater Company and a special "Community Hero" award presentation by Lavender Seniors. The theme of this year's Aging in Place event is "Our Words Our Time" and it is important that seniors show up, speak up, and ask questions as to how the Affordable Care Act will have an impact on their healthcare benefits. Aging In Place, A Symposium and Resource Fair for Older Adults is sponsored by Kaiser Permanente and will be held on Friday October 5 from 10AM to 1PM at the Marina Community Center, 15301 Wicks Blvd. San Leandro. COULD CA BUDGET CUTS WORSEN?

By Wendy Peterson, Director Senior Service Coalition of Alameda County The November Ballot Initiative, Proposition 30, is key to preserving what remains of long term services and supports after years of state cuts. Why? Isn't this tax increase for California's wealthy targeted at preserving public school funding, along with community colleges and universities? Yes, but the revenue infusion would attack the state's "structural deficit," freeing up an estimated \$5.6 billion General Fund dollars this year and more over the next seven years. Prop 30 would also put the recent "Realignment" into the state constitution, an important safeguard for counties that are taking on funding and responsibility for public safety and social services programs that once belonged to the state. My Desire For History: Essays in Gay,
Community and Labor History, By Allan Berube,
University of North Carolina Press
Allan Berube won the 1996 MacArthur Foundation Award
and spent five years doing landmark research on gay history, much of it in the Bay Area. He is known chiefly for
"Coming Out Under Fire: The History of Gay Men and
Women in World War 11. He died in 2007. His essays
range from the Aids crisis, drag shows, to political conflicts
on gay rights. Makes compelling reading.--Frank Howell

5 REASONS AGING IS AWESOME

- 1. More Awake Time That's right, more time to enjoy life. Seniors need about 1.5 hours less sleep on average than their younger counterparts, according to one study.
- 2. Wearing rose-colored glasses-Being happy may come down to attitude, studies have shown. That's great news for older adults, whose brains seem to be wired to remember the good times. A brain-scanning study published in 2010 in the journal Cortex revealed that older adults' rose-colored glasses may be linked to the way the brain processes emotional contents.
- 3. Being grandparents -No diapers. No temper tantrums. No fevers and ear infections. Aging means you get to enjoy grandkids, as if they were your own, but without any of the frustrations.
- 4. Wisdom- Like a fine wine, older adults have been aged to perfection it seems. As you age, you may have a tougher time tuning out irrelevant information, but this lack of focus can actually boost memory, according to research published in 2010 in the journal Psychological Science. Seniors have the unique ability to "hyper-bind" the irrelevant information, essentially tying it to other information that is appearing at the same time. This type of memory could help older adults with decision-making.
- 5. Rewarding Sex Life—Sex drive seems to stay as long as you age. One 2007 study published in the New England Journal of Medicine surveyed adults ages 57 to 85, finding more than half of 75- to 85-year-olds reported a roll in the hay at least two to three times a month, and 23 percent reported having sex at least once a week. Oral sex appeared to be less "ageless." Nearly 60 percent of the participants under 65 years old said they had engaged in oral sex in the previous 12 months, compared with 31 percent for the over-75s.

On the Campaign Trail, Medicare Continues to be Central Topic -By The Alliance for Retired Americans With the Democratic and Republican conventions over, Medicare continues to garner attention. Launching a twoday campaign swing in Florida, former President Bill Clinton pushed back in Miami on Tuesday September 11 against what he described as Republican scare tactics over health care programs for older Americans — then provided his own frightening predictions about what would happen to seniors if Mitt Romney became president. According to the Los Angeles Times, Clinton said that the Republican nominee was misleading voters by arguing that President Obama's health care overhaul "robbed Medicare of \$716 billion," noting that the money would mainly be cut from future payments to hospitals and insurance companies, not beneficiaries. He also said that "countless thousands" of seniors had voted against Democrats in 2010 because "they were given misinformation" about their Medicare votes. "The first time they did that it was their fault. If we let it happen again it is our fault, and we should not let them do it," Clinton said. Clinton said that if Romney were elected and followed through on his pledge to repeal the health care law, Medicare and seniors would pay \$600 a year more for prescription drugs — part of the Affordable Care Act moved money from insurance companies and hospitals and into coverage for medicine — and the Medicare trust fund would "go broke" in 2016, eight years earlier than with the health law (More at http://lat.ms/QE73tJ).


