2013 Genny Awards

Each year, The Gennys recognize the most important changes towards a greater quality of life for LGBT older people. Weighted voting by professionals and the public took place in December. The Genny Awards are named after "Gen Silent", the critically-acclaimed documentary that sheds light on the unique issues facing LGBT seniors. Here are the results: 9. The Diverse Elders Coalition Report In July. The Diverse Elders Coalition released "Securing Our Future: Advancing Economic Security for Diverse Elders." The report described issues facing elders of color and LGBT elders and offers policy recommendations in key areas of their well-being including Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid and health care reform, 8. Prop 8 and Parts of DOMA found unconstitutional but high court has final say, millions now wait for the U.S. Supreme Court to hear several cases that could decide marriage equality nationwide. 7. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Issues New Rules Prohibiting Discrimination Based on Sexual Orientation and/or Gender Identity. In January the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Shaun Donovan, announced new regulations to ensure that housing that receives HUD funding is open to all eligible regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. 6. New Research: "Sexual Minority Stress Risk' for Older Gays" A groundbreaking study published in the American Journal of Public Health explored the mental health of older gay men who survived the AIDS crisis and came of age during the gay rights movement. Because when I was 17 I had been kicked out by my dad because I was gay and moved in with my boyfriend and his mother. I kept going to school even though it was many miles from where I now lived. When I graduated I did not go to my school's prom because I could not take my boyfriend so this was a way to give the youth of today what I could not enjoy. So I became a Volunteer AKA Chaperon and had a ball watching those scared kids walk up to the entrance to Centennial Hall with all the protesters screaming very nasty things and holding up awful signs and cursing at the youth even though they had brought their young children with them. The fun thing was that the Chaperons wore fancy dress and Tuxedos. The youth had designed the décor of the prom and decided to dress in the same motif. They were SO proud of how well they had succeeded. I think the success of Gay Prom was because the youth made it their own and the staff and volunteers supported them and gave them a safe venue to be themselves. Some youth had their parents bring them and pick them up after. A coat room, food and refreshments were provided for both the youth and volunteers. King and Queen, Best Dressed contest and a professional photo service was also provided. And a game room where they could relax, have some fun when not dancing and win prizes is also part of gay prom. Police protected them and escorts were provided in case they needed to go to their cars. VIP's we given escorted tours. Over the years popularity grew and the youth came from far and wide. Genny's Continued from page 1 - Wright of the Williams Institute at UCLA, found that in addition to stigma experienced as a result of their sexual identity, older gay men's mental health was also impacted by loss of peers to AIDS. 5. AoA Issues Guidelines Inclusive of Sexual Orientation and/or Gender Identity. In July the Administration on Aging released new guidelines empowering Area Agencies on Aging that receive AoA funds to prioritize funding, outreach, and data collection based on the clarified definition of "greatest social need" that is inclusive of LGBT older adults. 4. White House Conference on LGBT Aging, In May. The White House hosted a conference on LGBT Aging in Miami giving local leaders and advocates for LGBT elders another groundbreaking opportunity to consult with key officials at the national level, including Assistant Secretary for Aging Kathy Greenlee. 3. Marriage Equality and LGBT candidates win big in November. In Maryland, marriage equality won by popular vote. In Wisconsin, the first

openly gay person was elected to the US Senate. The wins reflected success for a number of similar candidates and measures around the country. 2. LGBT Elder Americans Act of 2012 Introduced. In September, Sen. Michael Bennet (D-CO) introduced the LGBT Elder Americans Act which would classify LGBT elders as a vulnerable population, permanently establish the National Resource Center on LGBT Aging, improve data collection, and prioritize grants for organizations working to improve LGBT health, long-term care, and access to culturally appropriate services. 1.Social Security Equality Act of 2012. The Social Security Act of 2012, introduced by Congresswoman Linda Sánchez, would eliminate the SSA's policy that denies same-sex couples the same benefits as married heterosexual couples. —By Gen Silent & The Genny Awards
