

#### **Book Review**

#### **First-born Sons**




My husband and I spend 4-6 of California's "winter" months (January-June) in small-town Costa Rica, where we have more time to read to each other than we do in Oakland. We finally got around to reading this 2022 book – downloaded as an e-book two years ago – last month. One of several books written by Vincent Traughber Meis, an openly-gay local (San Leandro) author, this is the third of his novels that we have reviewed here at Lavender Seniors.

Vincent has anticipated the considerable challenges of tackling a modified meta-sequel, following up with a number of the most beloved characters from some of his earlier novels. Four of the key characters in this 391-page book are the Burd siblings from Four Calling Burds, his 2019 novel, along with characters introduced in other earlier publications. Keeping straight the ages, sexual orientations, sociopolitical leanings and personalities – difficult for the reader – was probably difficult for the author, as well. There were times when we longed for a genealogical "Appendix" like William Faulkner included in several of his novels, like The Sound and the Fury, containing generations of (fictional) Compson family history.

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The four Burd siblings (brothers Augie and Lio, sisters AJ and M) comprise an extremely eclectic combination of characters.

Augie (white) and his husband, Reuben (Latino), have fathered a mixed-race son (a teenager now) who wants desperately to meet his biological mother (black), a surrogate not particularly willing to meet with the son and his gay fathers. One of the attempts to stall on the son's obsession is to make an unlikely trip to Thailand, where they meet a British family (black wife, white husband, sexually fluid son and daughter, both mixed-race, as well). Augie and Reuben's son falls for the English family daughter – plus the gay fathers (particularly Augie) have sexual fantasies (and some realities) with the young apparently-polyamorous son from England.

Sister AJ is in a complicated relationship with a Mexican man who once abducted and held her and her brother hostage while the siblings were on vacation south of the border. She's also dealing frantically with her ex-husband, who has taken a shine to the Proud Boys, threatening (tragically) to get their oldest son involved in right-wing political activities.

Sister M spends much of the book trying to figure out how to tell her husband that she's planning to transition from female to transman. Taking a cruise and spending time on a ship quarantined by Covid doesn't play the role M has hoped for in easing conversations about that transition with her long-term husband.

Brother Lio (also once held hostage in Mexico by his sister's current beau) primarily plays the role of comforter/mediator in taking the edge off of his siblings' multifaceted problems and excitements.

Throw in Byron and Lamar (a black, now-blinded DJ whose career is sidelined by Covid), from one previous Meis novel, plus Rebecca and George from another Meis book (George becomes involved with Lamar) and you have a potentially very complicated network of cross-pollinating relationships. Reading each chapter may take a paragraph or six to understand where you are and which of the siblings (or hangerson) are being dealt with here.

Vincent does an amazing job of weaving in contemporary issues like George Floyd's murder, Black Lives Matter, Breonna Taylor's death by police, controversies over pandemic issues like masking and need for vaccination development, etc., into whatever memories each reader might have of that disturbing era of American history. The final chapter (34) takes place in October 2020 (a few months before the first Covid vaccines are released). Many of the loose ends are tied up, though there are few details of how some of those resolutions may have evolved. AJ has married Chato (her one-time abductor); Lamar is moving in with George (a couple decades his senior); and a backyard barbeque is planned to celebrate all of the developments.

The book ends somewhat abruptly with a California earthquake shaking the group, knocking bottles off the shelf, etc., perhaps symbolically ending with the message that most of the characters have survived the Covid pandemic, one nephew is dead, the murderers of one of the characters' lovers have been retributively killed long ago and now it's time for everybody to move on. There are multi-faceted and complicated situations galore to be resolved. Characters are very Diverse, fairly Equitable and mostly Inclusive (dare we say this is a DEI novel?!)





# Mental Health at the Intersections Conference Queer Joy!




